## C ONVOC ATION <br> OF THE 119 ${ }^{\text {A }}$ ASSEMBLY OF THE INTER-PARLAMENTARY UNION

## M adam President,

Mr. President,
It is our pleasure to inform you that the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly of the Inter-Parliamentary Union and related meetings will be held at the Centre international de Conférences de Genève (CICG), Geneva (Switzerland) from M onday, 13 to W ednesday, 15 O ctober 2008.

## 1. AGENDA

The agenda of the Assembly is as follows:

1. Election of the President and Vice-Presidents of the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly
2. Consideration of possible requests for the inclusion of an emergency item in the Assembly agenda
3. Panel discussions on the subject items chosen for debate by the three Standing Committees during the $120^{\text {th }}$ Assembly in April 2009 in Addis Ababa (Ethiopia):
(i) Advancing nuclear non-proliferation and disarmament, and securing the entry into force of the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty: The role of parliaments
(ii) Climate change, sustainable development models, and renewable energies
(iii) Freedom of expression and the right to information
4. Report of the IPU Committee on United Nations Affairs
5. Amendments to the Statutes and Rules of the Inter-Parliamentary U nion

## 2. PANEL DISCUSSIONS

There will be three panel discussions on the subject items that have been selected for debate at the $120^{\text {th }}$ Assembly. Based on the first experience in 2007, the time set aside for each of these panels has been increased to three hours.

The format and conduct of the panels will be largely informal, with focus on debate and interaction. They will be moderated by two or more experts. The co-Rapporteurs will also make very brief (maximum five minutes) introductions of their draft report.

The aim of the panels is to help raise the awareness of IPU Members of the subjects included in the agenda of the $120^{\text {th }}$ Assembly. There will be no negotiations as such and all prepared speeches setting out formal positions are largely discouraged.

The panels also offer the participants an opportunity to provide comments and suggestions on the preliminary draft reports that have been prepared by the co-Rapporteurs. This will provide the coRapporteurs with an intermediary checkpoint halfway through the drafting process and help them to enrich their reports and recommendations.

There will be no formal outcome of the panels apart from a record of their proceedings.

## 3. TIMETABLE *

The timetable of the Assembly is set out in Annex I. The closing sitting of the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly will take place on W ednesday, 150 ctober, from $\mathbf{4}$ p.m. to 5.30 p.m. During this sitting, the report on the eventual emergency item included in the Assembly agenda will be presented and the draft resolution submitted for adoption. Delegations are kindly requested to bear this in mind when making their travel arrangements.

## 4. EMERGENCY ITEM

According to Assembly Rule 11 and Article 14.2 of the Statutes, any Member of the Union may request the inclusion of an emergency item in the Assembly agenda. If the Assembly decides to include an emergency item n its agenda, this will be debated by the Assembly on Monday, 130 ctober 2008. Provision has also been made on the following day for an eventual meeting of a drafting committee to prepare a draft resolution.

## 5. PARTICIPATION

Each IPU Member may appoint a maximum of five delegates to the second annual session of the Assembly, or seven for parliaments of countries with a population of one hundred million inhabitants or more. Any delegation that, for three consecutive sessions of the Assembly, is composed exclusively of parliamentarians of the same sex shall, however, automatically be reduced by one person.

Please note that the number of additional MPs accompanying delegations as Advisers must not exceed two.
IPU Members whose arrears equal or exceed the amount of the contributions due from them for the preceding two full years may not be represented by more than two delegates at meetings of the Union (Article 5.2 of the Statutes).

[^0]Associate Members may participate in the Assembly and its Standing Committees with the same rights as M embers, with the exception of the right to vote and to present candidates for elective office.

International organizations and other bodies invited by the Governing Council to be represented at the Assembly as observers are entitled to send a maximum of two delegates.

## 6. STEERING COMMITTEE

The Steering Committee of the Assembly shall be composed of the President of the Assembly, the President of the Inter-Parliamentary Union and the Vice-President of the Executive Committee. The Presidents of the Standing Committees may take part in its work in an advisory capacity.

The Steering Committee, assisted by the IPU Secretary General, is mandated to take all appropriate measures to ensure the effective organization and normal functioning of the Assembly proceedings.

## 7. TABLE SHOWING THE ALLO CATION OF VOTES

A provisional table showing the votes allocated to delegations at the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly is contained in Annex II.

Members are kindly requested to check the figures concerning them and, if necessary, inform in writing the IPU Secretariat in Geneva of any modifications required, preferably in advance. The final table showing the allocation of votes at the Assembly will be distributed at the opening of the session.

## 8. LANGUAGES

The Secretariat of the Inter-Parliamentary U nion will provide simultaneous interpretation into and from the two official languages of the Union: English and French, as well as Arabic and Spanish, at the meetings of all statutory bodies.

Four other interpretation channels have been reserved for Chinese, Italian, Japanese and Russian at sittings of the Assembly, the Governing Council, and for the Panel discussions.
Delegates may, exceptionally, use another language provided that they arrange for their speech to be interpreted into one of the IPU 's official languages, and that copies of the speech be given to the Chief Interpreter (Ms. F. Steinig-Huang) well in advance and no later than two hours before it is to be delivered.

## 9. MEETINGS OF OTHER BODIES

O ther bodies will hold meetings during the Assembly; their members will be convened by way of a separate letter. They include:
> The Governing Council (13, 14 and 150 ctober, public sittings);
$>$ The Executive Committee (10, 11 and 150 ctober, in camera);
$>\quad$ The Coordinating Committee of W omen Parliamentarians (12 O ctober, in camera);
> The Gender Partnership Group (10 and 110 ctober, in camera);
$>\quad$ The Committee on the Human Rights of Parliamentarians (11, 12, 13 and 140 ctober, in camera);
> The Committee on Middle East Questions (12 and 130 ctober, in camera);
> The IPU Committee on United Nations Affairs (13 and 150 ctober, public sittings).

The Association of Secretaries General of Parliaments (ASGP) will also meet at the CICG during the Assembly. It will be convened by its President.

## PO ST-ASSEMBLY MEETINGS

IPU/ASGP/IFLA Conference on parliamentary information
On Thursday, 160 ctober 2008, a Conference on parliamentary information, organized jointly by the Inter-Parliamentary Union, the Association of Secretaries General of Parliaments (ASGP), and the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) will take place at the CICG.

Attached is the Conference Convocation, as well as the draft agenda, registration form and information document. Should you intend to participate in the Conference, the registration form should be filled out and duly returned to the IPU Secretariat.

Parliamentary Seminar on the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women

Also on 16 October, the Fifth Annual Parliamentary Seminar, organized jointly by the InterParliamentary Union and the United Nations, will be held at the CICG. Information on the Seminar will be sent out shortly to all Members.

## 10. ADDITIO NAL INFO RMATION ON THE SESSION

Further information concerning the session will be provided in the Assembly Guidebook and in the "Additional information" document, which will be distributed to delegations upon registration.

## Journal

Every day during the Assembly, participants will find in all meeting rooms and at the Registration and Information desk the "Journal", which provides the latest updates on the programme of meetings and other important information designed to facilitate their participation in the proceedings of the session.

## 11. RESULTS OF THE ASSEMBLY

All delegations will receive two printed copies of the Results of the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly and a diskette containing the Results can be sent on request. In addition, the document will be accessible on the IPU website (www.ipu.org) within 10 days following the close of the Assembly, and a complete electronic version of the Results can be downloaded from the IPU site in PDF format.

Delegates are also informed that this service will only hand over identity badges and documentation to representatives from their Permanent Missions in Geneva if a signed letter of authorization has been received from the Member Parliament to this effect.

Important:
Particular attention is drawn to the fact that, even if identity badges have been collected by delegations' Permanent Missions, upon their arrival at the CICG, delegations are kindly requested to check-in immediately at the Registration and Information service to ensure that the information in the List of Participants concerning their delegation is accurate.

## 13. HOTEL ACCOMODATION

Delegations from countries with a Permanent Mission in Geneva are kindly requested to make their hotel reservations through their respective Mission. The Permanent Missions in Geneva are all informed of the holding of the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly and are accustomed to receiving national delegations to United $N$ ations meetings and to handling hotel reservations for them. Many of them have signed agreements and obtained preferential rates with hotels close to the Palais des N ations area and the CICG.
Delegations from countries that do not have a diplomatic representation in Geneva may reserve their rooms either via their preferred tourist operator or through the Geneva Tourism Office. Should delegations wish to use the services offered by the Geneva Tourism Office, they are kindly requested to contact the IPU Secretariat, which will subsequently send them a hotel reservation form. However, attention is drawn to the fact that, in keeping with the practice of all hotels in Geneva, only reservation forms returned with details of a credit card as a guarantee will be confirmed. The hotel reservation form should be returned directly to the Geneva Tourism Office by no later than $\mathbf{1}$ September 2008, with copy to the IPU Secretariat.

## 14. VISAS

Strict regulations are in force regarding entry into Switzerland and entry is refused to persons not holding the required visa. Delegates requiring an entry visa must obtain one from the Swiss consulate or diplomatic mission in their country of residence.

Please note that Geneva Airport is located on the Swiss-French border and also has a French entry point. Some flights arriving from Paris or other French airports to Geneva are therefore considered as domestic flights. Delegates travelling via France must therefore also check with the competent French authorities to ascertain if a French or European Union visa is required for travel through a French airport en route to Geneva.

In recent years, it has been noted that more and more delegations request assistance with entry visas for Switzerland and often such requests are sent at a very late stage. While the IPU will continue to assist delegates, your attention is drawn to the fact that the Swiss authorities require that a clear time frame be respected.
Any delegations in need of assistance must therefore send their requests as soon as possible, and in any case no later than three weeks prior to the date of arrival. The following details should be provided: full name, date and place of birth, nationality, type of national passport and number (date of issue and expiry), date of arrival and flight number. There is no guarantee that last-minute requests, especially those falling over weekends when the corresponding Swiss services are closed, can be dealt with in a timely manner.

Please also take due note that only in very exceptional cases, if a delegate has been unable to obtain a visa from the Swiss consulate or diplomatic country in his/her country of residence, can a visa be obtained upon arrival at Geneva Airport. This is only possible if the IPU Secretariat in Geneva has received the delegate's registration form and has been advised accordingly by e-mail (postbox@ mail.ipu.org) or via facsimile (+4122 9194160 ) well ahead of time, thereby respecting the deadline stated above.

We hope that your Parliament will be represented at the $119^{\text {th }}$ Assembly of the Inter-Parliamentary Union and that the delegation, under your leadership, will take an active part in the proceedings.
